What We Stand For



- We defend **civil liberties** and rights guaranteed to each individual, including freedom of speech and expression, equal protection under the law, and the right to personal privacy.
- We **advocate for individuals** who are threatened or persecuted for speech, or who are held to a different set of rules for language or conduct based on their skin color, ancestry, or other immutable characteristics.

Overview of the Issues



In this cultural moment, conflicting views of American history and society are polarizing our country

- Illiberal and regressive ideologies have captured many of our cultural, media, medical, and educational institutions
- The common feature that unites these ideologies is the view that all people are defined primarily by immutable characteristics such as skin color or ancestry, and that we are valuable as representatives of an identity group, rather than as unique human beings
- Proponents of these regressive ideologies advocate for policies that would take us backward - toward discrimination and division - instead of forward, toward a more fair, optimistic and just future

Chapter Goals



- Empower: Organize members and host events. Build community. Activate FAIR Resources
- **Inform:** Research laws and policies, educate FAIR members and the local community. Volunteer for school committees. Interview political candidates and share their answers.





Colorado's Education Governance Model






Colorado State Board of Education

State Board Statutory Authority



Title 22 of the Colorado Revised Statutes outlines the roles and responsibilities of the state board, including:

Overseeing Commissioner and Department of Education Adopting state standards, assessments and graduation guidelines

Evaluating and monitoring school performance (i.e., annual targets, district accreditation, etc.)

Adopting rules for education programs and grants

Adopting educator performance standards and licensure requirements

Hearing charter school appeals

Approving grant recipients and amounts

Granting waivers from state education statutes

Authority of State vs Local School Boards



As a "Local Control" state, there are several powers that lie outside of the State Board of Education's purview. The authors of the state's Constitution "made the choice to place control 'as near the people as possible' by creating a representative government in miniature to govern instruction."

Local School Board Authority

- Curriculum
- Personnel
- Budget
- School calendars
- Classroom policy
- Charter school application and renewal
- Hires Superintendent

State School Board Authority

- Distribute state and federal funds
- Regulate educator licensing
- Approve grade-level standards
- Accredit public school districts
- Charter school appeals
- Hires Commissioner of Education

Attributes of a Pro-Human Board of Education





- Is skeptical of policies and programs that promote identity groups as superior to the individual (e.g., Culturally Responsive Education)
- Rejects the expectation that academic outcomes should be equivalent across groups (e.g., Equity)
- Respects the role that parents play in raising their children in accordance with their own personal beliefs, values and convictions
- Maintains a focus on academic excellence without the distraction of social justice activism

Concerns in Education



- Advocating for your child's academic needs
- · Bullying physical and online
- Staff shortages
- Controversial curriculum and instructional materials
- Physical safety internal and external
- Declining academic performance
- · Mental health and resourcing
- Disruptive classrooms
- Special education staff crisis, funding, backlog



Updated Social Studies Standards


HB19-1192: Inclusion of American Minorities in Teaching Civil Government



- This <u>regulation</u> amended curriculum requirements for civics and history education
 - Expanded U.S. civics and history PK-12 education requirements for history and civil government studies to add the contributions of Asian Americans, LGBTQ individuals, religious minorities and the "intersectionality of significant social and cultural features within these communities."
 - The bill had a nefarious "safety clause" claiming "this act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety", which prevented the public from being able to petition for a referendum vote on the bill before it became law
 - Created a 16-member history, culture, social contributions, and civil government in education commission, which would make recommendations to the State Board of Education

Introduction of Revised Social Studies Standards





- The revisions to Colorado's Social Studies Standards were released November 2021 and went through several weeks of public scrutiny
- Many people were shocked to see how the US was portrayed
 - Our country was founded on the premise of oppressing marginalized groups rather than on the idea of individuals seeking freedom and opportunity
 - Students learn to group people by their skin color or sexuality and generalize about each individual group member's perspective on life based on stereotypes
- The proposed first-grade standards included discussions related to sexual orientation and gender identity

Responses to Proposed Standards Round One



- FAIR submitted public comment in January 2022 in which the following concerns were identified:
 - Overarching focus on immutable characteristics over which children have no control
 - Emphasis on groups rather than individuals
 - Suggesting that members of groups inevitably think, feel, and experience in the same way
 - The standards review committee considered the record-setting number of public comments and modified the new standards before presenting its final work to the State Board of Education in the Spring of 2022
 - Removed 27 references to "LGBTQ", leaving only five references
 - Removed the mention of LGBTQ from below 4th grade, which is more in-line with a state law disallowing comprehensive human sexuality courses below fourth grade



Responses to Proposed Standards Round Two






- Many progressive groups including parents, students, and teachers rallied in defense of what they called "the more inclusive and specific version of the standards." They said students would benefit from seeing themselves in the curriculum and in American history
 - Youth who identified as LGBTQ testified that they would have understood themselves better and feared less for their futures if they had learned about gay or transgender people living full lives and contributing to their communities
- In November 2022, the Colorado State Board of Education majority rejected the review committee's revisions. They restored most of the cut material with some formatting changes to reduce repetition. They also rejected parents' demand that they should control when sexual orientation and gender identity are introduced to their young children. Additionally, the acronym "LGBTQ" was added into the civics standards beginning in preschool

How Social Studies Standards Are Being Rolled-Out





Using the state's teaching materials is optional; the subject matter and developing a resource bank was required by House Bill 19-1192

- Teachers now have access to <u>educational resources</u>
 that are meant to teach students about the history,
 culture, and social contributions of American minorities,
 based on the group to whom they belong
 - For example, Colorado's first and second graders can learn about the story behind Harvey Milk's gay pride flag, while third graders can learn about California's failed 1978 ban on lesbian and gay teachers, Milk's death, and his murderer's controversial sentencing

What Can You Do?





- Email state legislators and request that they rescind HB19-1192
- Email the Colorado Department of Education (CDE) and request that they remove the list of Voluntary Annotated Resources from their website
- Encourage your local school board to not utilize the resources on the CDE website
- Vote for the state board of education candidate who will not prioritize identity groups over individuals *and* who will respect the role of parents



Position Statement



FAIR promotes the constitutional right of parents/guardians to raise their children as they see fit, which includes decisions about their children's education. The right to direct the upbringing of one's child is recognized as a fundamental due process right under the Fourteenth Amendment.
